


- I have experience in managing the club finances: I just leave the funds in the account and this policy was successful in promoting sound fiscal responsibility.

- Records will continue to be audited yearly... More often if members are so inclined or someone has nothing better to do. Open Book Policy!


My name is Guy O'Reilly and I am running for Treasurer!

Winter Flying Tips - by John Riley

Let's face it, it won't be long until our cozy clubhouse resembles the situation depicted in the photo to the right. Yes, winter, that wonderful time of year when everything is cold and miserable. There's no need to mothball everything until the Spring though. Herewith, some suggestions, tips and products to make winter flying more enjoyable. *Caveat emptor* though - much of this information came from online forums, newsgroups, or are hearsay, so caution is advised if checking any of the suggestions out.





Skis - Three commercially available sets are shown here, although it's easy to make them yourself. The Du-Bro set, on the left, are plastic and have received a lot of positive comments on the web - however. I found the attachment method for the torsion springs to be awkward, unlike the Jay Dee metal skis (centre) which

worked quite well. The wooden Unionville Hobby skis are quite economical. To avoid icing and sticking of snow, it is advised to let the skis reach air temperature after removing your plane from the car before setting it on the ground. Another tip is to wax the skis with car or ski wax.

Keep those hands warm - Not much fun when you can't feel the control sticks because of numbness. One solution is a transmitter glove, which look effective. The one shown here is made by Great Hobbies. Also, RCFCT member Brad Sandbrook has a unit of his own design for sale. An interesting option described by a winter enthusiast on the web is to heat the transmitter glove, by placing an 8x8 inch plywood panel wrapped with nichrome wire and covered in cardboard inside the glove, behind the transmitter. The unit provided 36 watts at 12 volts, and he keeps a motorcycle battery on his back to power it.



Get your motor running

Fuel additives/Priming:

- Use fuel with 5-10% more nitro than would normally be used in the summer. This helps the engine run a little hotter. Another suggestion is to add 2-3% acetone to the fuel perhaps its greater volatility is helpful.
- -There were a number of suggestions about using warm fuel the idea is to keep your fuel jug toasty warm in your car, before fueling the plane. Not only might this help with engine temperature, the fuel will be less viscous, and it will keep the radio battery warm if it's located near the fuel tank.
- Prime the engine (a few drops in the carb) with one of the following: lighter fluid, naptha (Coleman fuel), automotive starting fluid (ether), fuel injector cleaner, or WD-40. Some people claim that a newer formulation of WD-40 doesn't work as well.
- Another priming solution is to use a mixture of half glow fuel and half gasoline. Yet another suggestion is to put 10% gasoline in the fuel for cold weather running (better be sure that the fuel system is gas proof).

Other engine considerations: Use the hottest glow plug available (I wonder how a four cycle plug might work in a two stroke engine?). Generally the mixture will need to be richer, since the denser air cold air will contain more oxygen. Some have suggested wrapping aluminum foil around the cylinder fins to keep the engine warmer – perhaps if it's really cold; I'd be a little concerned about going too far and having the engine overheat.

Watch those batteries

- The capacity of a battery diminishes with cold weather. The reason is that since the power supplied by a battery is the result of chemical reactions, and since chemical reaction rates generally decrease with temperature, less current can be supplied at colder temperatures. While this would be dependent on the actual temperature, estimates of 30-40% decrease have been suggested.
- On the other hand, on their website, Sanyo claims that their Cadnica batteries have an operating range of between -20 to 60 C, and that they work particularly well at low temperatures. One forum correspondent said that he only got two full flights from a 600 ma receiver pack, and suggested that part of the reason might be higher current draw from the cold sluggish servos.

Heat the airplane - Some have reported success with placing one of those small chemical hand warmers ("hotshot") inside the fuselage, thereby keeping the internals warm. Another idea is to park the plane when not flying under your car, near the hot muffler – sounds like this could turn out not so well without proper supervision....

If none of this works, I suppose we could all move to Florida....
